Ang is an Omaha-based mixed media artist, curator, and advocate. They are a 2020 Young, Black, and Influential award recipient for Creativity. Ang represented the state of Nebraska in the Mana Urban Arts Get out the Vote poster campaign. Their art practice focuses on past and present themes of racial inequity, class privilege, and LGBTQIA2S+ identities.

Marsha P. "Pay It No Mind" Johnson was a Black transgender woman who was an LGBTQ rights activist and an outspoken advocate for trans people of color- she was an LGBTQ and Civil Rights Icon. She led the Stonewall Uprising in 1969 and along with Sylvia Rivera, she later established the Street Transvestite (now Transgender) Action Revolutionaries (STAR), a group committed to helping homeless transgender youth in New York City.

Monica Roberts was a Black transgender blogger, writer, and transgender rights advocate. She was the founding editor of TransGriot, a blog focusing on issues pertaining to trans women, particularly Black women and other women of color. Monica was one of the first journalists to report the murders of trans women of color, and provided a blueprint for the national media on how to report about trans people with sensitivity and empathy.

Dominique Morgan (She/Her) is an award-winning artist, activist, and TEDx speaker. As the Executive Director of Black & Pink, the largest prison abolitionist organization in the United States, she works daily to dismantle the systems that perpetuate violence on LGBTQ/GNC people and individuals living with HIV/AIDS. Partnering her lived experience of being impacted by mass incarceration (including 18 months in solitary confinement), with a decade of change-making artistry, advocacy, and background in public health, she continues to work in spaces of sex education, radical self-care, and transformative youth development with intentions of dismantling the prison industrial complex and its impact on our communities.
